

Internal Audit Report

Internal audit is the periodic independent review of a council's internal controls resulting in an assurance report designed to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the activities and operating procedures under the council's control. Managing the council's internal controls should be a day-to-day function of the staff and management and not left for internal audit.

The council is required to take appropriate action on all matters raised in reports from internal and external audit and to respond to matters brought to its attention by internal and external audit. Failure to take appropriate action may lead to a qualified audit opinion.

To the Chairman of the Council:

I met with Vicky Smith (Clerk/RFO) on 3 May 2019 to carry out the year-end audit of the Council. Upon examination of bookkeeping, due process, risk management, budget, payroll, asset control, bank reconciliations and year-end procedures; it is clear that every effort is made to ensure that the Council acts lawfully, transparently and in accordance with proper practices.

The Council has a turnover of under £25,000 and is therefore obliged to comply with the Transparency Code by publishing its financial and governance documents on its website. The Council is not currently eligible to use the General Power of Competence and as such understands that it must ensure it spends within its legal powers (particularly Section 137 under which there were items of expenditure in 2018/19).

Issues raised in 2017/18:

- There were no issues raised by the Internal Auditor from the 2017/18 audit.

Issues raised in 2018/19:

- It is evident from governing documents and when speaking with the Clerk/RFO that the Council is fully aware of its responsibilities regarding public finances, especially with regards to accountability, governance and transparency. However, this could be even more effective by ensuring the following:
 - The inclusion of each legal power to spend with the relevant budget heading when completing the budgeting process.
 - The Chairman initials all preceding pages of the minutes to his/her signature.
 - The total balance of all accounts is recorded in the minutes when the Council approves the bank reconciliation.
 - A rota is established whereby a checklist is completed by a different member throughout the year in order to test specific internal controls and report any findings to the Council.

Other than the above matters, the Council appears to be performing well, with its business affairs managed properly by a very competent Clerk/RFO and committed Councillors.

This report is based on the evidence made available to me. It would be incorrect to view internal audit as the detailed inspection of all records and transactions of a council in order to detect error or fraud. Consequently, the report is limited to those matters set out above.
